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
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JENNIFER LAHASKY, Music Director

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The Summer Singers of Lee's Summit



The Summer Singers of Lee's Summit was created in June 2014 as an ensemble of the Kansas City-based William Baker Choral Foundation. Their 2014 performance of Mozart's *Missa Brevis in D* was heard by a capacity audience and hailed as "…a significant contribution to Kansas City's growing family of choirs." Today's concert marks their ninth annual performance. Highlights of previous performances have included Haydn's *The Creation*, Mozart's *Coronation Mass*, & *Requiem*, Vivaldi's *Gloria*, and Handel's *Coronation Anthems* and selections from *Messiah*.

The Summer Singers of Lee's Summit continues the tradition that was called "the very best of amateur music-making..." by Pierre

Ruhe of *The Atlanta Constitution*. Beginning with the original Summer Singers of Atlanta in 1990, the Choral Foundation has created numerous summer choruses that now involve hundreds of participants from multiple states. Jennifer Lahasky, who served the Summer Singers of Lee's Summit as Associate Music Director from 2017-2021, was appointed Music Director & Conductor beginning with the 2022 season.

No audition is required for membership in the Summer Singers. All adults and mature youth from the age of 16 are invited to participate. Weekly rehearsals begin each June and culminate in performances with distinguished soloists and professional orchestras at the end of the summer. Registration opens March 1, 2024. Megan Moore is an up-and coming singer and conductor in the Kansas City community. Originally from the Dallas-Fort Worth metroplex, she graduated summa cum laude from William Jewell College in May 2017, with B.A. degrees in Music, Psychology, and Applied Critical Thought and Inquiry. During her time at Jewell, she studied voice under Dr. Ronald Witzke; served as student conductor for the award-winning Concert Choir and William Jewell Handbells; and was involved in the Chapel Choir, Choral Scholars, and Schola Cantorum. Additionally, she offered her voice and conducting skills as a Choral Scholar for Grace and Holy Trinity Cathedral under the direction of Canon John Schaefer, then Dr. Paul Meier. Recently, Megan has sung in Carnegie Hall with Mid-America Productions and Winthrop University under the direction of Dr. Jeremy Mims, as well as in Texas-based Voci d'Amici, conducted by Dr.

Loyd Hawthorne. Locally, Ms. Moore sings soprano in the many renowned vocal ensembles, including Musica Vocale (led by Dr. Arnold Epley), Cardinalis (led by Dr. Anthony Maglione), The William Baker Festival Singers (led by Dr. William Baker), and Songflower Chorale (led by Dr. Geoffrey Wilcken). Additionally, Ms. Moore serves as the Choral Assistant at St. Mary's Episcopal Church in downtown Kansas City. During the work week, she serves as an Account Administrator for a travel insurance company and spends lots of time preparing for her many musical endeavors. She served as Choral Intern for the Kansas City ensembles of the Choral Foundation from 2020-2021.

JOSH MARKLEY, Baritone



Josh Markley, baritone, has been an active oratorio performer since 2008. Some of his concert repertoire includes Mahler's Symphony No. 8: Symphony of a Thousand, Vaughn Williams' A Sea Symphony, Orff's Carmina Burana, Haydn's Creation, Bach's B-minor Mass and St. Matthew Passion, Handel's Messiah, Elijah in Mendelssohn's Elijah, and Lucifero in Handel's La Resurrezione. On the opera stage, Markley has sung roles such as Il Conte in Mozart's Le nozze di Figaro, Marcello in Puccini's La Boheme, Tarquinius in Britten's Lucretia, Don Alfonso in Mozart's Così fan tutte, Angelotti in Puccini's Tosca among others. On top of his experiences as a solo performer, Markley has also sung as a professional chorister with the Kansas City Lyric Opera as well as several professional choirs in the Kansas City area such as Te Deum, KC Vitas and others. Perhaps most importantly, Markley is an ardent educator. He has taught students from grade school through the

collegiate level in public and private institutions, and he is currently the Director of Music at the Barstow School. He completed his Doctorate of Musical Arts in voice with honors at the University of Kansas in 2016. His dissertation on the baritone voice and its development during the Baroque era, focusing on its use in Handel oratorios, has been referenced as an "excellent source of information regarding the baritone voice in early music" by the New York Metropolitan Opera Guild. Dr. Markley appeared in Mendelssohn's *Elijab* in 2022 with the Summer Singers of Kansas City.

GEOFFREY WILCKEN, Piano



Geoffrey Wilcken is a prolific composer, conductor, organist, and pianist. Recent commissions include One Out Of Many (2015) for the 40th anniversary of the Lawrence Civic Choir, Everyone's Brother (2019) for the Musica Vocale in Kansas City, Rosette (2014) for the dedication of the new organ at Village Presbyterian Church, Prairie Village, KS, and Music of the Spheres (2014) for the combined bands and choirs of Johnson County Community College, Overland Park KS. He has also created numerous works for sacred and liturgical use, including Anthems for the Cross (2017) for St. Mary's Episcopal Church, and arrangements such as Angel Noels (2009) for the Kansas City Fine Arts Chorale. He has twice won the Music Teachers National Association composition contest, and has been awarded the Anthony J. Cius outstanding composer

prize. In 2015 he received the first ever Kansas Choral Composition award for his work, *Life's Symphony*, and was named runner-up in the 2017 ACDA Brock composition competition. He has titles currently available from Alliance Music Publications, Colla Voce Press, and Alfred Publishing House.

Dr. Wilcken is Organist for the historic St. Mary's Episcopal Church in Kansas City and is an adjunct faculty member of Kansas City Kansas Community College and Mid-America Nazarene University. He is Music Director of the Songflower Chorale. He holds a Doctor of Musical Arts and the Master of Music in choral conducting, both from the University of Kansas, and a Bachelor of Music in composition from Iowa State University. **www.gwcomposer.me**

All of the songs in the **Holocaust Cantata**, originally in Polish, were found in the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum archives (Aleksander Kulisiewicz Collection) and were written by prisoners while incarcerated in Nazi concentration camps. The readings are based on interview transcripts, historical data, and the story of Irena Augustyñska Kafka. The Holocaust Cantata contains no plot, rather each song and reading represents a different person and a different time in the Holocaust experience. *-Donald McCullough*
