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Lynn Swanson, Music Director & Conductor



Ms. Swanson is a native of the Atlanta suburb of Marietta, Georgia. She holds the Bachelor of Music in Organ Performance from Shorter University, and the Master of Music Education in Choral Pedagogy from the University of Kansas.

Ms. Swanson is one of the most consequential leaders in the nearly four-decade history of the William Baker Choral Foundation. She has enjoyed a significant international career, and has just been honored with an ACME Award (Artists, Composers, Musicologists, and Educators) by Mu Phi Epsilon International Music Fraternity for having achieved a high level of musical excellence in her concentrated field. She served as Associate Organist of the Kronberg Evangelical Church, Kronberg, Germany and Christ the King Anglican Church, Frankfurt, Germany. Her position also included a choral performance in the iconic Notre Dame Cathedral and

organ/choral performance at the American Cathedral in Paris. Significant church positions where she has served as Music Director and as Organist/Choirmaster, include All Saints Cathedral in Milwaukee, St. Benedict's Episcopal Church in Smyrna, Georgia, and Due West United Methodist Church in Marietta. She currently serves as Music Director & Organist at Grace Episcopal Church in Gainesville, GA. The Grace Parish Choir will serve as Choir-in-Residence at Exeter Cathedral, England in August, 2024.

From 2017-2018 she served as Assistant Director of the Zhuhai Classical Children's Choir in Zhuhai, China, near Hong Kong. During her lauded tenure there she conducted the chorus on national television as part of the Tenth Annual International Chamber Music Festival of the Central Conservatory of Music in Beijing. While in residence in China, she traveled to the city of Wuhan where she served as Artist-in-Residence at the Hong An Tian Thai Temple Monastery. During her three week tenure she prepared the 60 voice Monastery Choir for their first performance at the Beijing International Choral Competition 2018. The choir performed Italian motets, anthems in Latin, English and Chinese. The choir was awarded gold medals for their inaugural performance by adjudicators from around the world.

Ms. Swanson served a number of leading positions with the Choral Foundation from 2006-2018. She founded the Cobb Summer Singers in 2006, the Northside Young Singers in 2008, the Cobb Festival Singers in 2009, and the Institute for Healthy Singing in 2015. She served as associate director of the Choral Foundation's original ensemble, now called The New South Festival Singers, from 2010 to 2015, before her appointment as the second music director of the ensemble in 2015, a positions she held until 2017. Lynn Swanson co-created the Summer Singers of Lee's Summit in 2014, and served as Executive Associate Music Director of the Choral Foundation from 2011-2017. Her choirs have recorded three albums: Between Heaven and Earth, Live in Charleston, and Legacies of Light.

From 2017-2019, Ms. Swanson's blog ~ Developing Voices was featured as the headline blog each Tuesday on ChoralNet.org ~ The American Choral Directors Association's daily newsletter. Her articles were all researched-based bringing new findings on the science behind the voice to aid fellow singers and choral directors around the world.

Ms. Swanson's conducting portfolio of choral-orchestral masterworks is extensive, including Brahms Ein deutsches Requiem, Bach: Mass in B Minor, Magnificat, Christ lag in todesbanden, and Wachet auf; Faure: Requiem; Handel: Messiah, Israel in Egypt, Dettingen Te Deum and Coronation Anthems, Mozart: Coronation Mass, Great Mass in C Minor, Solemn Vespers Missa Brevis in D, Mass in D Beethoven: Mass in C and Mendelssohn: Elijah, Saint-Saëns: Christmas Oratorio along with many other works. Collaborations have involved musicians from the Kansas City Symphony, the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra, and the Kazinetti String Quartet.

Ms. Swanson is a member of the Mu Phi Epsilon Fraternity and the American Choral Directors Association. In 2023 she was one of eight music leaders world-wide named a recipient of the ACME Award, given annually by the Mu Phi Epsilon International Music Fraternity.

The Cobb Summer Singers



The Cobb Summer Singers was originally founded in 2006 by Lynn Swanson. After participating in the 2005 Summer Singers of Atlanta under the direction of Dr. William Baker, Ms. Swanson made the decision to create a new ensemble on the same model based in Cobb County. The project was an immediate success with more than 55 singers joining for the first season to perform acclaimed concerts of classics and spirituals before capacity audiences. In early 2009 the Cobb Summer Singers became a constituent ensemble of the William Baker Choral Foundation, a national organization created in Atlanta in 1990 that presently sponsors ten ensembles and three educational institutes active in four states and involving hundreds of men, women, and youth. As a result of the support

of the Choral Foundation, the Cobb Summer Singers has grown dramatically in artistic accomplishment.

Performances have included Mozart: Great Mass in C Minor, Coronation Mass and Solemn Vespers; Beethoven: Mass in C; Brahms: Ein deutsches Requiem; Handel: Israel in Egypt, Coronation Anthems, and Judas Maccabeaus, among many other immortal masterworks.

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

Arietha Lockhart, coloratura soprano, has been awarded many prizes and honors, including a fellowship to perform the role of Zerbinetta (Ariadne auf Naxos) at the Aspen Music Festival Opera Theatre, 2nd place in the first Classical Singer Competition sponsored by Classical Singer Magazine, The National Opera Association Competition's Legacy Award in the professional division, 2nd place in The Center for Contemporary Opera International Competition (prize, a New York debut recital at Weill Recital Hall of Carnegie Hall), and the Friedrich Shorr Memorial Prize in Voice and 3rd place in the Oratorio Society of New York competition. During studies at the American Institute for Musical Studies, won the first place vote of the jury in the

Meistersinger Competition in Graz, Austria, and received the gold medallion as the audience's 1st place choice.

Ms. Lockhart is a member of the Grammy Award winning Atlanta Symphony Orchestra Chorus and has performed with the Atlanta Chamber Players and the Atlanta Baroque Orchestra. She is a favorite of Choral Foundation audiences, having performed in several productions with the William Baker Festival Singers, the Cobb Summer Singers, and the Summer Singers of Atlanta, including Bach's St. John Passion, Haydn's The Creation, Mendelssohn's Elijah, Mozart's Requiem & Mass in C.Minor, and Beethoven Mass in C and Symphony No. 9. She is a former music educator and Co-President of the Atlanta Chapter of Mu Phi Epsilon Music Fraternity.



Aliyah Auerbach, mezzo-soprano, is a performer and an educator in the Atlanta area. She graduated summa cum laude from Emory University, earning her Bachelor of Arts degree in Vocal Performance and her Bachelor of Science degree in Neuroscience and Behavioral Biology. Since her time at Emory, she has explored a multi-faceted career in music, from performance to mentorship to education.

Over the years, Aliyah has performed with a number of ensembles, including the Emory Concert Choir, Emory University Chorus, Collegium Vocale, and the Gathering, Emory's all-female a cappella group. She is

currently the soprano staff singer at St. James United Methodist Church. She is also the youth conductor at St. James, where she works with school-age children on the fundamentals of choir singing.

Aliyah has experience singing in various languages, including Mandarin. In 2018, she performed a popular Chinese ballad as a featured soloist at the National Chinese Language Conference. She has also been a featured soloist at both the 2018 and 2019 Atlanta Chinese New Year Celebrations. As one of her primary occupations, Aliyah is a music mentor at Songs for Kids, a nonprofit organization dedicated to providing musical enrichment to children with illness, disability, or injury.



Holly McCarren, alto, is a native of Atlanta. She completed her Bachelor of Music in Vocal Performance in 1997. Under the tutelage of Early Music Specialist Lyle Nordstrom, she participated in Master Classes with Emma Kirkby & Anthony Rooley, Paul Hilliard and the Theatre of Voices, and Elizabeth Mannion. She went on to pursue graduate studies with a graduate teaching fellowship at The University of Oregon where she studied Early Music performance practices with Baroque Cellist Marc Vanscheeuwijck. Ms. McCarren was a participant in a master class with the well-known early music group

Tapestry. While in Oregon, she was a soloist at Central Lutheran Church with organist Andrew ElRay Stewart-Cook. Musical theater experience includes Ruth in *The Pirates of Penzance* and Buttercup in *HMS Pinafore* with the Atlanta Lyric Theatre under the direction of J. Lynn Thompson. She has worked with Cartersville Opera, The Oregon Lyric Opera, and The Oregon Opera Ensemble. Ms. McCarren can be found on a soon-to-be-released CD of Gace Brule music with The Goliard Ensemble under the direction of John Hillenbrand. Solo concert engagements include singing with the Carroll Symphony Orchestra, The Atlanta Baroque Orchestra, The Etowah Chamber Orchestra, and New Trinity Baroque. Ms. McCarren is currently an adjunct teacher of voice at Clayton College & State University and a soloist at All Saints' Episcopal Church in Atlanta. She appears on the Towerhill recordings of Promised Land and A Christmas Alleluia by the Choirs of All Saints. She appeared in the 2014 performance of Mozart's *Coronation Mass* with conductor Lynn Swanson and the Festival Singers.



Jonathan Pilkington, tenor, Atlanta based tenor and voice teacher, specializes in oratorio and art song. In recent years as an oratorio soloist, he has performed solos in Mendelssohn's Elijah, Mozart's Requiem, Handel's Messiah, Verdi's Requiem, Orff's Carmina Burana, and Handel's Judas Maccabaeus, among others. As tenor soloist, he sang in the New York premiere of Mendelson's Humboldt Cantata, as well as a performance of Elliott Carter's The Defense of Corinth with the National Chorale at Avery Fisher Hall. Recent recital appearances have included performances at regional colleges, universities, and churches, as

well as in Dallas, TX, Kansas City, MO, and northern California, featuring a variety of American, English, French, German, and Italian song repertoire. He holds degrees from Shorter College (B.M.), Westminster Choir College (M.M), and University of Georgia (D.M.A.). As a dedicated voice teacher, he has participated in the highly selective NATS Intern Program and competed further training at the LoVetri Institute for Somatic VoiceworkTM at Baldwin Wallace University. After ten years of teaching at Piedmont College, Pilkington currently teaches at United Music Studios and at his private studios in Atlanta and LaGrange.



Zachary Norris Futch, bass, is the Director of Traditional Music at Dahlonega UMC and a student at Piedmont University. He is a member of the Piedmont Chorale and the Piedmont Singers and has performed many operatic roles including the title role in Le nozze di Figaro, John Proctor from The Crucible, and Leporello from Don Giovanni. Mr. Futch also regularly performs as a soloist and has recently served as baritone soloist in Gabriel Faure's Requiem, Ralph Vaughn Williams' Five Mystical Songs, Maurice Duruflé's Requiem, and Carl Orff's Carmina Burana. He also composes music and has recently had multiple pieces premiered in the local area. He currently lives in Dahlonega, Georgia with his wife and two cats. Soli Deo Gloria!



She is a native of Marietta and holds a Bachelor of Arts in Piano Performance from Florida State University in Tallahassee, with post-graduate study in piano performance at Georgia State University. She is a certified Kindermusik instructor and she teaches piano in private studio. Ms. Pirl makes her home in North Atlanta.
